MONDAY, OCTOBER 21, 2019 ANN LEE HUSSEY, WORLD POLIO

Ann Lee Hussey has made the eradication of polio and the alleviation of suffering by polio survivors her life's work. In the past 12 years she has actively participated in 25 volunteer NID (National Immunization Days) teams organizing and leading the last 18 teams herself, choosing to take those NIDs to places that do not often see westerners – Chad, Mali, Bangladesh, Niger, Nigeria as well as less "touristy" destinations in Egypt and India – where the need is greatest and where the publicity and goodwill surrounding the trip are as critical as the immunizations themselves to help communicate the need for eradication. She has shared her story and passion hundreds of times carrying the message of PolioPlus around the Rotary world and beyond, raising money and creating new converts to the fight. She is determined that no child will needlessly have to suffer what she herself, a polio survivor, has been through. But for all the immunizations Ann Lee has herself made possible through NIDs, she considers fundraising and public awareness her most critical accomplishments. Ann Lee's work has earned her the International Service Award for a Polio-Free World and the Rotary Service Above Self Award. Outside Rotary, Ann Lee served as a trustee of York Hospital and currently serves on the board of Port Resources, an organization that supports developmentally challenged adults in Portland Maine

GRANT SPOTLIGHT TMA - TEEN APPRENTICE PROGRAM 2018-19 2ND CYCLE \$4,000 YOUTH SERVICE COMMITTEE

Established in 2015, the Teen Apprentice Program invites youth into the Museum - similar to the efforts of George Stevens in 1916. As a pilot, Teen Apprentices have been recruited from the Toledo School for the Arts, a public community school which serves a diverse population drawn from the Toledo metropolitan area and focuses on college preparatory academic curriculum in an intense visual and performing arts environment. The Teen Apprentices have created youth-focused events, also known as (Y)our Nights, that have significantly increased teen attendance at the Museum. As an example, over 300 high school students, representing 52 different schools attended an event that included a DJ in the galleries, food, prizes and an opportunity to meet a contemporary artist, Kehinde Wiley at a (Y)our Night event in February 2016. Additionally, the Teen Apprentice experience has included the opportunity for summer employment prior to the summer of 2016 and the Teen Apprentice program, TMA had not employed youth under the age of 18 (this was a pivotal shift in the organizational culture for inclusion of youth at the TMA). Through the planning of these events and gaining work experience.

In Memory of Past President Clint Mauk 1981-1982



July 18, 1927- October 16, 2019

Clint served as a Seaman, 1st Class in the U.S. Navy during WWII, attended Dartmouth College, receiving a BA in English and later found himself in the world of banking which he did very well. He began in Rotary July 1, 1954. He was Club President 1981-1982 and a Foundation Trustee 2000, 2001 and he 'delightfully' and 'proudly' served as our Club's Historian! Clint was also a Paul Harris Fellow and one of the founding member of the Toledo Rotary Club Foundation 1912 Fellow. Clint has a long history within our Club, chairing and participating in too many committees to list and his love for Rotary and its mission always at the forefront. His regular history presentations which took place in 03 and 04 were the prerequisite to the written word and kept many Rotarians riveted to their seats on Monday as each of us learned the history of Toledo and his love for it and all of NW Ohio. Clint's, Historical Tales of Toledo, that he authored, along with PP Walt McGhee, has brought in \$239,030 for the Toledo Rotary Club Foundation and will continue into the future.

He was an Honorary Member of Toledo Rotary as well as an Honorary Member of Perrysburg Rotary.

Additionally, his love of bow-ties and those he sported were known far and wide and a regular point of conversation for all who knew him—if you didn't wear a tie or a bow-tie to Rotary, Clint would surely have something to say.

In Memory of Past President Eric Summons 1995-1996



December 27, 1943 - October 7, 2019

Eric retired from the United States Army and the Army Reserves as a Lt. Colonel following 25 years of service. He enlisted during the turbulent Vietnam war years, attended Officer Candidate School and was deployed to Vietnam. For his service, he was awarded both the National Defense Service and Bronze Star Medals.

Eric joined Toledo Rotary in February, 1985 and served as its President in 1995-96. Eric was a Paul Harris Fellow and served on multiple committees. He believed strongly in the motto of "Service Above Self" and focused his attention toward it surrounding Club projects for youth. Eric felt strongly that there should be compulsory military service. Recognized in the area as a consulting psychologist, Eric was drawn to his work, his clients, his attention to detail and the constant pursuit of more knowledge. Through his business, Selection Resource Inc., Eric worked with countless clients over the years to strengthen employee performance and improve organizational operations. He was about 'People in the Workplace.'

Eric is survived by his wife, Olivia; daughters, Mary (Jeffrey Clause) and Sarah (David Laforet); brother Richard; step-children, Nina Habib Borders (Stephen), John Habib (Christopher Sandersfeld), Lisa Habib Millewich (Geoffrey); three stepgrandchildren, Leah and Cara Borders and Bryce Millewich; and Pamela Summons, mother of his daughters.


