Fellow Rotarians and Friends,

In 2018-2019 our foundation granted \$206,948 in funding to worthy organizations in our community. This annual financial foundation report highlights our efforts.

The Black Tie Affair fundraiser netted \$74,021 to fund Transformational Projects. We established a fund for long-term, significant projects, often in collaboration with other organizations. In 2018-2019 Club members approved the following three projects: Universal Pre-K, Lead Abatement and Water Advocacy. Our Foundation funds both traditional and transformational grants.

In 1915, the Rotary Club of Toledo created a charitable fund when it began funding medical and educational services directed to crippled children in the Toledo area. Our charitable activities of the members of the Rotary Club of Toledo have more than a 100-year history of helping our community! In 2018-2019 your donations made it possible to fund 31 traditional grants showcased within this report.

As Trustees of the Toledo Rotary Foundation it is our goal and responsibility to continue the growth of our endowment. Historically, only funds received from legacy gifts are placed in the endowment while all other gifts become part of our annual grants to our community. In an effort to offer more options for giving we have initiated The Toledo Rotary Club Foundation 1912 Fellowship. This Fellowship offers an opportunity to donate a one-time \$1,000 contribution to the Toledo Rotary Club Foundation endowment fund. On September 30, 2019 Past Presidents Dick Anderson, Walt Churchill and Clint Mauk were recognized as founding 1912 Fellows.

This is an exciting time to be part of our dynamic Toledo Rotary Club Foundation as we continue making a difference both locally and internationally.

Provided funding to pack 50,000 nutritious meals for families & individuals in need locally & internationally.

Funding provided a new electronic scoreboard within the Hawkins Elementary School, partnering with Epworth UMC & their K-6 sports programs.

Erie Shores Boy Scouts:

Funding ensures that every young person has the opportunity to increase their self-confidence and outdoor adventure that scouting provides through the Scoutreach program.

Monroe Street Neighborhood Center:

Funding for reading materials & supplies used by college interns with 3 hours reading training per day for 60 students.

Read for Literacy:

Funding provided learning opportunities for the Teen Writing program serving 500 participants at Claire's Day. YS

Toledo Day Nursery:

Secured funds to install rubber flooring on the playground; a safety feature. Funds were used to purchase a Tot Town--the structure is specifically made for children between the ages of 6 to 23 months.

The Teen Apprentices have created youth-focused events, known as(Y)our Nights, that have significantly increased teen attendance at the Museum.

Funding provided travel in order to orchestrate a kidney transplant in Rome.




